## **Course Description**

This course serves as one of the requirements for eligibility to participate in the Political Science Honors Thesis Program. Spring quarter focuses on designing an appropriate research strategy/design that will help you to answer your research question(s). Students are expected to spend most of their time on their own preliminary research. To structure this preliminary research, a series of short assignments will be required. In addition to active, professional and collegial participation in discussion, students will be asked to complete all assignments on time. Late assignments will be docked 20% per day. Obviously incomplete assignments will be treated as late until they are complete.

The reading assignments help to facilitate your individual writing process and group discussion. Students are expected to do the reading <u>before</u> seminar and be prepared to discuss the reading during seminar.

To enrich the learning process we will collaborate with on-going Departmental Speaker Series as well as guest speakers from various campus representatives.

Please think carefully about whether you really want engage in the *research process*. If you lack the time or the motivation to work harder than you ever have before on a research project, I recommend not starting the process towards admittance to the Honors Thesis Program.

- f. Does the method allow the author to effectively answer the research question(s)? If so, how and if not, why not.
- g. What are some possible alternatives to the approach taken by the author?
